Diversion and Housing Crisis Mediation

During 2019 PIT, CoC continued process improvement on count methodology by involving those with lived experience in identifying known locations--including utilizing youth with lived experience as enumerators. More and better organized/trained volunteers enhanced unsheltered counts in our southernmost county where hard to reach encampments are numerous. Significant improvement in utilizing data produced by law enforcement meant we had over 300 known locations identified--including over 100 active encampments.

Given methodological and logistical improvements we attribute the slight reduction in the 2019 count as a result of growing community competency around Housing First principles and housing focused interventions. In addition, the CoC has begun a robust community-wide training effort around housing crisis meditation and diversion.
