#### **Ending Homelessness**


Do you think we can end homelessness in our community?

#### Functional Zero

Functional Zero is reached when, at any point, the number of people (Vets, Chronic, Families) experiencing sheltered & unsheltered homelessness is less than the monthly housing placement rate for that population.
