Introduction

• Study of homeless deaths in Central Florida examining the following variables: age at death, manner of death, location of death, zip codes with highest death rate, substances contributing to accidental deaths

Objectives:

- Illuminate trends in homeless death over 3 years by analyzing data from Medical Examiner office
- Utilize this data to inform stake holders in an effort to appropriate funds for targeted services including those related to harm reduction which are proven to prevent death, injury, disease and overdose
- Identify service gaps
- Inform policy discussions, programs and practices in the community




Definition and classifications

- Homelessness: Living in a shelter temporarily or living in space not designed for conventional dwelling (CDC)
- Decedents without address identified as homeless
- Manner of death: natural, accidental, undetermined, suicide or homicide







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





Age at death









Manner of death








Death Location Classification


- The location of death were classified based on below criteria:
 - Unsheltered included: camps, ponds, train tracks, field, parking lot, trail, yard, wooded area, restaurant
 - Sheltered included: public buildings, shed, mobile home, vehicle, bus stop, shelter, hospice facility
 - Hospitals





Location of death

Totals

- Total number of deaths:237
- July 2019-December 2019 38 deaths
- January 2020-December 2020 96 deaths
- January 2021-October 2021 114 deaths

Recommendations

- 1. Enhance low barrier access to substance use services in high use zip codes
- 2. Implore strategies such as medically assisted treatment and harm reduction techniques which are a pathway to prevention, treatment and recovery services
- 3. Increase the distribution of Narcan to outreach teams, case managers and other personnel coming into contact with high risk individuals
- Develop homeless mortality work-group



Recommendations

- 4. Incorporate more preventive care strategies in centers caring for persons experiencing homelessness to decrease the burden of preventable diseases including infectious disease associated with substance use
- 5. Target outreach efforts to those unsheltered and assist with efforts to engage in behavioral health treatment using an interdisciplinary team approach
- 6. Provide low barrier supportive housing options for those most vulnerable
- 7.Collaborate with stakeholders on standardizing data collection tools to enhance accuracy of reporting
